It's not hard to imagine that a congregation named Resurrection House Baptist Church takes the gospel message seriously. So, when Cru® Inner City offered the congregation an opportunity for evangelism training as part of an upcoming Easter Bag outreach, church leaders not only jumped at the chance — they took it a step further.

Once their training was completed, they turned their sights on the congregation's teenagers, encouraging the young people to exercise their evangelism muscles. As a result, the teens presented the gospel to 50 children who attended the church's Easter Bag outreach!

They used colorful Good News bead bracelets to share God's love, where each bead represents one element of the gospel story. The children were also given crayons, a toy, a treat of candy or fruit, and a *Meet the King* booklet — all carefully tucked inside special Easter Bags.

## Emi's Epiphany! "I was missing an essential element of my faith."

Emi was in the middle of a 13-week discipleship class when she had an epiphany. Despite her committed walk with Jesus, there was no intentionality when it came to discipleship.

"There's Scripture about keeping the Sabbath holy, and I feel like that applies to me ... and loving your neighbor, I feel like that applies to me, too," she said. "But it seemed like I kind of 'skipped over' the Scripture on discipling others — really building community with other Christians —and never took that command personally to heart before this discipleship training."

But as the Cru® Inner City discipleship course unfolded at a church in Chicago, Emi realized she was missing an essential element of her faith.

After completing the course, Emi has a new perspective on the importance discipleship plays in spiritual formation and accountability. Every minute



of the experience, including homework and the oneto two-hour post-work commute, was worth it.

"I know Scripture says go into the world and make disciples of other people," she said. "I have never seen that as a command on my life. I know it's something that the Lord says we should do. But until now, I had never seen it as something that I have to do."

Since completing the course, Emi is now investing in one-on-one discipleship training with a teen at her church while they work to expand youth ministry.

It was a quiet afternoon at the Agape Center in inner-city Chicago when the phone broke through the silence.

"I don't know how to ask this..." the voice on the other end told Cynthia, one of our staff leaders.

The caller identified himself as Ramone. He went on to say he was a student at the center 27 years ago and now lived out of state. He was recently diagnosed with depression and anxiety, but the medication he was given just wasn't working.

Feeling hopeless, he began to practice what he learned at the center all those years ago: <u>Prayer</u>. And it worked. Soon, Ramone was feeling better, so he asked God to remind him of past moments when he didn't need drugs or "other forms of pleasure" to feel good.

"Memories of the Agape Center rushed to my mind," Ramone said. "It was a time when I felt safe and good and pure."

Ramone wanted to know who might still be at the center, which operates a S.A.Y. Yes!® after-school program. Before calling, he visited the center's website and recognized several faces. Were there others?

## Off the Sidelines ... Playing for Christ!

Like most teen athletes, Tyler prefers his football action on the gridiron, not the sidelines. Thanks to his attendance at a faith-based sports camp, his commitment to Jesus has also shifted from spectator to active player.

"He's on the field and playing in the game," said Jaye Hill, who coordinates JAM Camp™, a joint

venture between Cru® Inner City and its sister ministry Athletes in Action®. "He's serving the Father and serving others."

Held each summer at the AIA® headquarters in Xenia, Ohio, the camp is designed to provide sports clinics in football, basketball, soccer, and volleyball. JAM — an acronym for Jesus, Athletics, and Manhood — also builds its

program around the gospel, instilling leadership and discipleship into the teen participants. Tyler and a group of other teens from Detroit traveled to Ohio to participate in JAM.

When Tyler first arrived at camp, he had a minimal understanding of Jesus, but his leadership skills stood out. As the week went on, the 17-year-old began getting up early every morning to join one of the adult mentors in prayer, walking the grounds and preparing the day's lessons.


As in any sports regimen, practice boosts player skills, and Tyler has demonstrated similar improvement in his spiritual walk, thanks to the continued influence of the camp's mentors and twicemonthly Bible studies launched at the end of camp.

"He's more attentive to his personal relationship with the Father, and he's holding his fellow brothers

in Christ accountable to their faith, challenging them with God's Word," Hill said. "I totally believe that he's been transformed through the camp and the Bible studies. He's a great kid, doing his best to follow Christ."

## A Lesson on Leadership



Samuel was just a boy when he was commissioned into service for the elderly priest, Eli. As his master rested, so did Samuel — until he heard a voice speaking to him. Samuel went to the priest, asking what he said. But the voice wasn't Eli. The third chapter of 1 Samuel records two more instances where Samuel hears the voice.

It is Eli who realizes God is talking to Samuel, but Samuel doesn't recognize His voice.

"Go, lie down, and if he calls you, you shall say, 'Speak, LORD, for your servant hears," Eli tells Samuel (1 Samuel 3:9 ESV).

This Old Testament passage speaks volumes in today's celebrity-driven culture, a fad that, unfortunately, has seeped into the church.

My heart is vexed by how the Western church perceives leadership. Leadership has also become celebrity-driven.

Leadership is viewed as some height to attain. Once we attain it, we convince ourselves that we've reached the pinnacle of all that God wants us to become. It's an idolatrous pursuit.

We know this because neither God nor Jesus ever referred to people as leaders. In the passage involving Samuel, notice what he doesn't say: "Speak, Lord, your future leader is listening" or "Speak, Lord, your future globally known speaker is listening." He uses the word "servant," which is how Jesus describes Himself in Luke 22:24-27.

In this synoptic account of the disciples arguing over who would be greatest in the kingdom, Jesus not only told the disciples that He wouldn't tolerate an attitude of superiority among them, but He also postured Himself among them as one who serves.

This is consistent in all of Jesus' teachings on servant leadership. In the case of Matthew 11:29, He describes himself as one who is meek and lowly in heart.

If the God of the universe describes Himself and His Son as servants, why do we have such a problem embracing this description for ourselves? Could it be because of our tendency to clamor in our flesh? We clamor for recognition and titles as if our significance is connected to it.

If we truly believe what God says about us is more important than what others say about us, I would argue that God's go-to description of us is "servant" versus "leader."

I believe this is a more fitting posture for Christfollowers who have leadership assignments.

In 1 Corinthians 4, Paul writes, "This is how one should regard us, as servants of Christ and stewards of the mysteries of God" (ESV).

As stewards, we may bear the responsibility of leadership, but we are not owners. We live in a culture that praises ownership, but Scripture tells us God is the sole — and soul — proprietor. That means leading Cru® Inner City is my assignment until the next person is appointed to steward it.

In the meantime, may we keep our focus heavenward.
